1.5	Sensory Hairs	Sensory hair update to advise that clipping/removal of hair within the rims of the auricles (ears) is <u>not permitted</u> as of 1 Jan 2025. Young Rider, however, is a specific age category of FEI Competition. Other FEI categories include Children, Juniors, and Pony Riders.
