For example, if there are 28 riders, the rider with the highest marks will be allocated 28 points, the second highest mark will receive 27 points working sequentially in descending order until all are allocated points. The scores for each phase are then added together to determine the overall Championship placings. Riders eliminated in one phase are not eligible for Championship placing for that class.
